OBITUARY OF FR. RYAN




Fr. John Ryan was born on 30th November 1941 in Argharina House, Dripsey, Co Cork, and died on the 31st of August, 2025 at the age of 84. He laboured in the Lord's Vineyard as a Priest for 59 years. Here is the excerpt from the written obituary of Fr. John from the Diocese on his mission in Dover. "Fr. John moved to Dover in September 1996 and was inducted by Bishop Jukes on 31st October 1996 and served there for almost 8 years. During his ministry the parish developed, and many lay led initiatives were encouraged by him. Fr. John was described by Bishop Jukes as an energetic and sacramental priest and he is to be commended for his pastoral care of the sick and the housebound. At that time the port of Dover was changing following the opening of the Channel Tunnel but it was still an important port and an entry point for refugees.

Fr. John, along with the other clergy in the Dover deanery, developed a pastoral outreach of welcome to these refugees, often going against the media hostility to them at that time. The parish of Dover under his leadership was a place of welcome, and Bishop Jukes commended this in his visitation report that there is a lot of work going on here." He was a popular parish priest, whose varied ministries brought him into contact with many different pastoral situations.

He was generous in his ministry and devoted to the people he served. May his gentle soul rest in Peace. Amen.

GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE FEAST OF THE EXALTATION OF THE CROSS



The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, celebrated on September 14, traces its origins to the early 4th century. After the Emperor Constantine's victory at the Battle of the Milvian Bridge (312 AD), his mother, St. Helena, travelled to the Holy Land and, according to tradition, discovered the True Cross of Christ around 326 AD. To honor this discovery, Constantine built the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem, which was dedicated on September 13, 335. The following day, September 14, the Cross was solemnly exalted and shown to the faithful, giving rise to the feast.

The cross is the supreme Christian paradox where victory is born of defeat. It is the meeting place of contradiction: humiliation and exaltation, suffering and glory. To be lifted high, Christ first descended into the depths of human pain. Both movements, downward and upward are salvific, both unveil the salvific love of God. Let this be a solemn reminder: Christian

leadership is not about prestige, but cruciform surrender. If one is unwilling to embrace the cross to die to self, comfort, and control, one cannot truly lead in the name of Christ.

What does the church teach about tattoos and body piercings? If your tattoos mean that you are consecrating yourself unto something other than God, then don't do that. If your tattoos mean that you are consecrating yourself to some kind of the dead or some sort of secret courts, then don't do that. The question is; what I am saying with this Tattoos? The church does not absolutely forbid tattoos or piercings. Moral teaching looks instead at intention, moderation, and respect for the body. Our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, meant for the glory of God. A tattoo is not sinful simply because it is a tattoo. What matters is whether it respects the dignity of the body, avoids vanity, and does not give scandal.

A small, modest tattoo may be morally neutral, but covering the body in ways that disfigure it, encourage immodesty, or imitate Pagan or anti-Christian practices would be wrong. The catechism teaches, "Respect for the human body is an expression of respect for the creator." That's paragraph 2290. The church calls us not to thoughtless self-expression, but to prudence, modesty and reverence for the body that will one day rise in glory. (Lev. 19-

Exodus 32:7-11. 13-14

'The Lord relented from the disaster that he had spoken of bringing on his people'

In those days: The LORD said to Moses, 'Go down, for your people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt, have corrupted themselves. They have turned aside quickly from the way that I commanded them. They have made for themselves a golden calf, and have worshipped it and sacrificed to it and said, "These are your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt!" And the LORD said to Moses, 'I have seen this people, and behold, it is a stiff-necked people. Now therefore let me alone, that my wrath may burn hot against them and I may consume them, in order that I may make a great nation of you.'

Gospel

Luke 15:1-32

'There will be joy in heaven over one sinner who repents' At that time: The tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to hear Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes grumbled, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them."

So he told them this parable: "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the open country, and go after the one that is lost until he finds it? And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbours, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.' Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance.

'Or what woman, having ten silver coins, if she loses one coin, does not light a lamp and sweep the house and seek diligently until she finds it? And when she has found it, she calls together her friends and neighbours, saying, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found the coin that I had lost.' Just so, I tell you, there is joy before the angels of God over one sinner who repents.'

And he said, "There was a man who had two sons. And the younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of property that is coming to me.' And he divided his property between them. Not many days later, the younger son gathered all he had and took a journey into a far country, and there he squandered his property in reckless living. And when he had spent everything, a severe famine arose in that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him into his fields to feed pigs. And he was longing to be fed with the pods that the pigs ate, and no one gave him anything.

'But when he came to himself, he said, 'How many of my father's hired servants have more than enough bread, but I perish here with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son. Treat me as one of your hired servants."' And he arose and came to his father. But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and felt compassion, and ran and embraced him and kissed him. And the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you. I am no longer worthy

to be called your son.' But the father said to his servants, 'Quickly, bring the best robe and put it on him, and put a ring on his finger, and shoes on his feet. And bring the fattened calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate. For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.' And they began to celebrate.

'Now his older son was in the field, and as he came and drew near to the house, he heard music and dancing. And he called one of the servants and asked what these things meant. And he said to him, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fattened calf, because he has received him back safe and sound.' But he was angry and refused to go in. His father came out and entreated him, but he answered his father, 'Look, these many years I have served you, and I never disobeyed your command, yet you never gave me a young goat, that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fattened calf for him!' And he said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. It was fitting to celebrate and be glad, for this your brother was dead, and is alive; he was lost, and is found.'"

Act of Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You.
